This program makes grants to non-profit organizations, social enterprises, United Nations agencies and other qualified groups working on innovative and impactful projects that seek to create scalable, long-term improvements in working conditions and the empowerment of workers in key sourcing markets. By supporting and partnering with organizations that have the capacity to address these systemic issues, we believe that the projects supported through the Supply Chain Investment Program will continue to create improvements long after each project is complete.

The Supply Chain Investment Program reflects our desire to contribute to the growing body of knowledge about systemic and root causes of noncompliance with labor standards around the world. By supporting program activities and engagement across all levels of global supply chains, we believe this gives us an opportunity to not only understand what contributes to poor working conditions, but to help address them in a systematic, replicable and scalable fashion.
